# A Timely IDEA

The ABLE Board of Directors completed a five-year strategic plan in April of 2023, and we have begun to implement some of the short-term priorities in this plan. One of them is IDEA, which stands for Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Access. Examples of creating equal access for full participation in society include brailled election ballots, Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra programs and programs from the Marcus Center, as well as books that are being read in ABLE's Sound Center. Here are just a few:



*Girl's Guide to Leaving* by Laura Villareal, a collection of poetry in which Villareal takes on identity, trauma, and personal origins while referencing Mexican folklore. Read by Margaret Casey.

*The Story of Civil War Hero Robert Smalls* by Janet Halfmann, a Civil War history book for young readers that tells the remarkable story of Robert Smalls, who escaped slavery along with 16 others on a boat that he captained. Read by Margaret Casey.

Somos Latinas: Voices of Wisconsin Latina Activists by Eloisa Gómez and Andrea-Teresa Arenas, in which twenty-five Latina women share stories from their lives as community activists in their own words. Read by Celeste Baldassare.

The Clothesline Code: The Story of Civil War Spies Lucy Ann and Dabney Walker by Janet Halfmann, a Civil War book for young readers that tells the true story of Lucy Ann and Dabney Walker, who escaped slavery and went on to create a secret code to help the Union army. Read by Janet Zoltan.

In Defense of Sovereignty: Protecting the Oneida Nation's Inherent Right to Self-Determination by Rebecca M. Webster, a collection of essays detailing the Oneida Nation's ongoing legal defense of its sovereignty and reservation lands. Read by Mike Browne.

*Calling the Water Drum* by Latisha Redding, a book for young readers that tells the story of Henri, a boy who must overcome grief after losing his parents at sea on the journey from their home of Haiti to the United States. Read by Margaret Casey.
