

ABLE, Wisconsin Talking Book and Braille Library, and Magnify LLC, together with Tosa's All-City Read, are making books available for blind and print disabled individuals. In ABLE's State of the Art Sound Center, audio volunteer Margaret Casey read aloud *What the Tide Leaves Behind* by Malcolm McDowell Woods, and audio volunteer Merete Mohs read aloud *Crossing the Pressure Line* by Laura Anne Bird. Blind and print disabled individuals will be able to read these books alongside their Tosa neighbors as they participate in the many planned activities in Wauwatosa beginning in February of 2025.



The Wonders of Wisconsin at the Milwaukee Public Museum

Braille Games, held on May 16th, was an amazing success. Thirty-five children from Milwaukee Public Schools and ten surrounding school districts participated, including five first-timers from the Wisconsin School for the Blind and Visually Impaired. Studying leaves with braille labels, writing stories about life in the "olden days" and learning about animals native to Wisconsin were some of the fun activities. The braille and tactile book *The Wonders of Wisconsin*, written by Milwaukee Public Museum staff, produced by

ABLE staff and given to all participants, has amazing tactile graphics, including animals, different types of leaves, and items used in the early 1900s.

ABLE collaborated with the Milwaukee Public Museum, Vision Forward, the Wisconsin Talking Book and Braille Library, and blind adult mentors from Beyond Vision to put on Braille Games. Thank you to the Glen Stacey Fund for funding Braille Games and also to PricewaterhouseCoopers for a Reimagination grant that supported Braille Games and also made *The Wonders of Wisconsin* available to blind children throughout Wisconsin.

Helping Children Build Their Braille Library

Thank you to the Forest County Potawatomi Foundation for funding braille copies of *The Adventures of* Marshmallow and Peter by Peter James Heath, and My Three Best Friends and Me, Zulay by Cari Best.

The Adventures of Marshmallow and Peter was written by a blind second-grader. The book explains the special relationship between Peter and his white cane (named Marshmallow), which is so important in giving Peter independence and helping him participate in activities like hiking, karate, piano lessons and soccer camp. My Three Best Friends and Me, Zulay features a blind first grader whose diverse group of friends cheer her on when she achieves her goal of running in a race.

Marshmallow and My Three Best Friends are both dual print and braille books.
